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III. Course Name and Description

TE 538 Womanist/Feminist Theology and Ethics

This interdisciplinary course will examine significant womanist and feminist theological and ethical thoughts in American religious culture. Womanist/Feminist methodology in reference to biblical interpretation, theology, and ethics within the context of Black women's racial, gender, and class experiences will serve as the foundation for the course.

IV. Course Objectives

The objectives of this course are to enable you to:

- demonstrate an understanding of women's history in America and the development of Womanist/Feminist thought.
- know the major points of Womanist/Feminist thought in theology and ethics.
- know the main differences between womanist/feminist and Western approaches to theology and ethics.

V. Course Policies

Class Attendance

Attendance for an online course is measured by participation in, completion of and submission of online course assignments as assigned/outlined in the course syllabus, schedule and on the course online page. Absence from this online course is determined by the lack of discussion forum post and assignment submissions.
